The Principal speaks:

Kia ora koutou katoa! Here we are at the end of Term 2 already! Halfway through the year, and starting to get very close to NZQA exams for our senior students.

Earlier this term, we were fortunate to have our local Community Constables spend time in our school speaking with our Year 7 and Year 8 students about cyberbullying, online behaviour and digital responsibility. Their presentations provided a timely and highly relevant learning opportunity for our students.

As many families are aware, schools across New Zealand continue to face challenges that originate online but often impact relationships and behaviour at school. Recently, we have experienced several incidents where online interactions have carried over into the classroom and school environment, affecting student wellbeing and learning.

In response, I have spoken with students during assemblies about our expectations for respectful behaviour both online and offline, as well as the consequences that can arise when poor choices are made. The messages delivered by our Community Constables reinforced these important conversations and helped students understand the real-life impact that online actions can have on themselves and others. Koorero a te Tumuaki Haere tonu The Principal speaks continued:

... I would also like to take this opportunity to remind families about our school's phone policy. The policy is designed to support learning, minimise distractions, and help create a safe and positive environment for all students. We ask parents and caregivers to continue supporting us by reinforcing appropriate phone use and online behaviour at home.

When schools and whanau work together, we are far better placed to help our children develop the skills, judgement, and resilience they need to navigate the online world safely and responsibly.

The partnership between home and school is critical when it comes to addressing cyberbullying and online safety. Children benefit most when they receive consistent messages from the adults around them. By maintaining open conversations with our young people about their online activity, monitoring their digital interactions, and working alongside the school when concerns arise, we can achieve much better outcomes for everyone involved.

We are grateful to our local Police team for sharing their expertise with our students and look forward to exploring opportunities to deliver the same programme with our senior students in the future.

Earlier this month our senior students enjoyed the School Ball at The Verandah in Hamilton and this was a great evening! Photos of this can be seen inside this e-Bulletin. Thank you to the Ball Committee for their organisation of this event.

Year 8 Science *Tau 8 Pūtaiao*



Our Year 8 scientists have been busy exploring the fascinating world of materials and their properties. Through hands-on investigations in the science laboratory, students examined the features of metals and non-metals, learning how these properties influence the way materials are used in everyday life.

To connect their learning with the real world, students also observed local construction sites and identified the wide range of materials being used. They investigated why certain materials are chosen for specific purposes, considering factors such as strength, durability and flexibility. This authentic learning experience encouraged students to think critically about how science and engineering work together to shape the world around us.

It has been exciting to see our young scientists developing their observation, investigation, and problem-solving skills while discovering the important role materials play in modern construction and design.

Important Reminder: Punctuality and Morning Drop-offs

We would like to remind all parents and caregivers that school starts promptly at **9:00am**, with a **warning bell at 8:55am**. It is important that students arrive at school on time to ensure they are settled and ready to learn from the beginning of the day. Students who arrive late must sign in at the **Student Centre**. Unless there is a **legitimate reason** for their lateness, they will be issued a **Dean's Detention**.

We appreciate your support in helping reinforce the importance of punctuality and ensuring that all students are set up for a successful day of learning.

ROAD SAFETY REMINDERS FOR PARENTS AND STUDENTS

As a school community, safety is our priority - especially on the roads around our school.

 A few important points to remember:

- You are **not** to park on dotted yellow line areas of the road outside the school. The yellow lines are there to keep our tamariki safe, so please adhere by the road rules. Parking on yellow lines is illegal and creates a severe safety hazard. **Local council traffic authorities will have increased patrols and ticketing on Elizabeth Street.** 
- Students walking to or from school must use public footpaths. **Do not** cut through private property as it is trespassing. If owners of private property see you trespassing they are within their rights to report it to the Police. Students are to be respectful of the walkway from behind D Block, otherwise the Council will close it.
- Students without a valid licence are not permitted to drive to or from school. Students with a Learner, Restricted or Full licence must follow the specific conditions of their licence at all times. If a student is found to be driving illegally, the Police may become involved and consequences can include fines, loss of licence or further legal action.

Respecting school grounds *Te whakaute i te papa o te kura*



A friendly reminder that there are rules that apply to school grounds. There are policies in place that outline no smoking and/or vaping on school grounds and no dogs on school grounds. These policies can be found on SchoolDocs (link and password found on our website) and these policies apply at any sports games played on school grounds too. We appreciate your understanding and respect for our school grounds in this.

Process for raising problems and concerns with the school *Te tukanga mo te whakaputa raruraru me nga awangawanga ki te kura*

We understand that from time to time parents/caregivers will have problems/concerns that they will want the school to know about. Tuakau College has a process in place for this to happen. Please understand that parents/caregivers are not usually able to go straight to the Principal. The first step in raising a problem/concern about your child(ren) is to speak to their Year Level Dean. Students should know who their Year Level Dean is by now. If they do not then there is a list on our website with their contact details. Once you have spoken to the Year Level Dean about the problem/issue they will follow it up/investigate further. If the Dean identifies that the problem/issue needs to be escalated to a higher level they will then refer it to a member of the Senior Leadership Team (SLT). The SLT will then investigate the problem further. The Principal will be involved if an SLT member refers the problem on to him.

It is important to note that if we do not know about the problem we are unable to help you. Sometimes we get parents/caregivers call telling us about an issue/problem that is serious that we could have prevented if they had told the Dean about it in the first instance. We appreciate your understanding in this process!

Stand Downs and Suspensions *Tu ki raro me te Whakatarewa*

Sometimes students at school are 'stood down' or 'suspended' and below is some information about what this means. A stand down is the formal removal of a student from school by the Principal for a specified period. Stand downs can be no more than five school days in a term or ten school days in a year. A stand down is usually anywhere from 1 - 5 days in length depending on the reason. While on stand down students are not allowed on or around the school grounds, nor are they permitted to attend any sports practices, games, socials or other school activities.

A suspension is the formal removal of a student from a school by the Principal until the Board decides the outcome of the suspension at a suspension meeting. At a suspension meeting the Board can decide to:

- Lift the suspension without conditions or
- Lift the suspension with reasonable conditions imposed or
- Extend the suspension with reasonable conditions imposed or
- exclude (if the student is under 16 years of age) or expel the student (if the student is over 16 years of age)

These are serious consequences and not what we want for our students, however all actions have consequences and unfortunately sometimes these are the consequences.

Attendance Codes *Waehere Haerenga*



Please note that if you call the school to let us know that your child will be absent, it is important you also provide a reason for your child being absent. Within the absence attendance code, there are different codes for the absence (depending on if the student is sick, on holiday, at a funeral/tangi, etc).

Please don't call the school and leave a message only saying your child is absent. Rather, please state they are absent and the reason for their absence. If you do not provide a reason for the absence it may be coded as 'Unjustified.'
