PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Kia ora koutou katoa

It has been a rollercoaster ride for all the students and staff this year. We have had some very difficult times with being thrown into the spotlight with the national media investigating us on a couple of fronts. Despite this we as a learning community have bounced back from these times.

I can assure everyone that the good times at Tuakau College certainly out-weigh the bad. We have a school full of fabulous young New Zealanders and staff that are passionate about the young people of Tuakau and are making a difference to their lives. We provide excellent opportunities that produce the right outcomes for our students.

In difficult times our school community pulls together to support each other. Our school is a College which is resilient and although it hurts and stresses us during these difficult times we have the right systems in place to bounce back. We are reflective and put things in place to ensure things do not happen again.

Student progress and achievement are always a focus for us.

At the end of the day we are here to raise achievement in a supportive environment which caters for each individual student's strengths and weaknesses. This is a huge job, but a doable job.

Many students enter at Year 7 or 9 and come to us with the skills and knowledge at differing levels. They come with a wide range of abilities. Some enrol with diagnosed conditions and problems that we have to cater for and we have some students that attend classes that have less than desirable behavioral issues. Our job as professional educators is to ensure that we take all factors into account and create a learning environment that all our students will benefit from.

The Tuakau College learning community, our school is doing just this and individualized learning is a happening event at Tuakau College. How do we know this?

Our NCEA results are an indicator of our success. Our job is to maintain an upward trend. The quality is indicated by the number of Merit and Excellence pass rates the student's achieve. A good example, in Level 1:

- We increased our NCEA results by 12%
- In 2009 our Level 1 NCEA certificates that were endorsed with 'Excellence' increased 6%.
- Also the grades for 'Merit' went up 7% П
- These increases were supported with a 13% decrease in the number of 'no endorsements'.

Literacy and Numeracy across the curriculum has increased our results. The emphasis on these two key ingredients has allowed students to unlock the language.

Staff have embraced NCEA and are doing awesome work in many areas across the curriculum not only at senior level but in the Junior and Middle Colleges.

The standards alignment is going to make it harder for students to get NCEA but we will continue to develop courses to minimize the effect of standards disappearing and students having fewer opportunities to achieve them.

Since NCEA has been in schools it has always been a major focus and we also now need to change tact and focus on the junior school which leads into the senior years. To do this we have divided our school into three 'Colleges' or schools within a school providing specialized or focused courses and teaching.

Years 7 & 8 is called the Junior College. Years 9 & 10 is the Middle College, and Years 11, 12 &13 is the Senior College. It is all about cementing the life skills so all our students are model citizens and achievers.

Another factor that has raised achievement is the quality professional development programmes which we use to up-skill staff regularly.

ISPs (Individual Strategic Plans) are another strategy used to raise achievement. In a Radio NZ programme: "The biggest influence on the future of the students is the family." Our ISPs allow parents and teachers to discuss the way their child is progressing and achieving, and by setting achievable goals this can only improve their achievement.

Our school is always reviewing and reflecting on what we are doing and is on a cycle of school improvement. We are proud of our 2009 ERO report because we gained a 'Merit'. Compared to many of the other secondary schools in the Franklin area we have done extremely well. Our report is a living document. We have listened to what the ERO team have said and have implemented strategies and other key initiatives to strive for 'Excellence' in the next ERO visit in 2012. By focusing on school improvement we will ensure our students achieve The very best in all things.

We have to continue to improve teaching and the professionalism that goes along with this important job. There is a range of teaching at Tuakau College just as there is in every other school. We are working very hard to ensure that the differences between teachers and what is happening in classrooms is small.

The final factor that has allowed our results to increase is taking into account the social impact, which can be significant and affect student learning. We are a school that ensures there is a minimal social impact on the students when they are at school. We lessen the disparities in the wider community by having a supportive, caring whanau house system, with wrap-around services like the Guidance Counsellor, Health Nurse, Social Workers in schools, Truancy Services, and others.

All these initiatives and the structures we have put in place at school have shifted our results in the right direction. All the changes we make are calculated changes and are not mutually exclusive. They are strategically thought out and are intertwined together as the essential threads that produce the Tuakau College fabric, our College culture.

The Gateway Program has also once again been a resounding success with record numbers of students involved with interest and achievement also at record levels.



Welcome to Bill White and Kandi Ngataki as newly elected parent members and to Jessie Hurst as the new student member for 2011. As a Board we are committed to giving every student the opportunity to achieve to the very best of their abilities.



You have brains in your head. You have feet in your shoes.


Head Boy - Zachary Taylor

THE THAKAH COLLEGE LIBRARY


