Level Three

MOLLY SYKES

Theme: Escape into books using Surrealism

My idea for my boards was the concept of escapism into books but trying to transfer that into a literal sense using Surrealism. I wanted to express how black and white and mundane reality can seem when you compare it to the colourful, fantastical world of dictional novels.

I've had multiple artist models who have inspired me throughout the year, however my main three artist models who have influenced my theme and my art are Guy Denning, Abelardo Morell and Diana Dihaze. All three artists have pieces or series that involve books or pages in some way but the way that the ideas were executed inspired me to attempt similar methods but adapt them into my style.

My favourite piece of my board is on the first board. It was inspired by Abelardo Morell's 'Alice in Wonderland' series. My piece inspired by it is the black and white painting of the stack of books that has an ink drawn portrait on it. I'm proud of how I used the combination of different mediums and techniques.

The majority of my pieces use oil paint in either colour or grayscale. I also used pages from books or scrap paper in quite a few pieces to create some visual interest. For my drawings, I used a lot of charcoal or fine liner. I use charcoal because I find I'm able to get it a lot darker and create more variety in tone than graphite. I used fine liners for either line work, pointillism or cross hatching. I've also painted a few watercolour pieces and one ink piece. Most of my reference photos involve some form of Photoshopping that I have done in order to maintain that surrealism throughout my board.

Molly received the Franklin Art Award at our Senior Prizegiving this year, for the Top Year 13 Art student in 2023, and we wish her well for the next stage in her life - a course at AUT.

Level Two

KUDZANAI MAKORE

Theme: Women and Cosmetics

I explored the relationship between women and cosmetics. The first board has soft paintings of bags, perfume and earrings. It was supposed to mimic the way marketers pose their products to make them look desirable. Then the second board introduces a more realistic way of how we use them after the sale point. The clutter and excess. I wanted to convey order and chaos in my art. The watercolor paintings are soothing to look at and quite satisfying, like when you purchase that item you really want and just stare at it. Then after a while you lose interest and throw it with the rest of the old products. This is now when I wanted to show clutter and chaos with the pencil, ink and oil paintings.

Bridget Hobson inspired me to base my board on cosmetics. Her oil paintings featured perfume bottles and lipsticks placed in front of an abstract background. She mainly uses the primary colors, plus orange, for her paintings. It gives the exciting feeling of a lady taking her time getting ready before a night with her girls.

My favorite piece on the board is the posing mannequin at the bottom of the first board. I like it because of the process to get the initial photo. We cut up black wrapping paper and glued a dress together. Then my friends and I set up the "stage" in a dark room. They held filters over the hand lights to get the pink and yellow light shining down. The painting reminds me of those fun times.

The objects were either from my mum's old jewelry box (which is what the mannequin is using for a 'stage') or recent buys from my sisters. I would set them up for a photo then print it out. The print out will be used as a guide for the colors.

If it is a watercolor, I would lightly pencil the drawing then build light to dark. After I'm done with the initial painting, I would then go over it again with a wash of purple over the shadows to deepen them. The same technique was used for the pencil drawings.

The acrylic and oil paintings had an undercoat of yellow ochre. This helped me gauge the values of the colors better. I also started dark to light because it is easy for the dark colors to lose saturation. I also went back in after it dried to clean up some edges and add highlights.

architecture and pursue it as a career. Using this as my board theme allows me to further understand the aesthetics and structure of buildings and other subjects by painting both the interior and exterior.

Level Two

KATHERINE CAO

Theme: Architecture

The theme of my board is architecture and structural designs using dollhouses, miniature toys and

decorations as subjects and painting them in a larger perspective to make them look life size. I chose this theme as it corresponds to what I aspire to do in the future as I plan to study

In my art I try to show how interesting different structures can be and how well they can work together in many different styles, as some are more realistic while others are more cartoony yet they still compliment each other. Most of the pieces have simple aspects when looked at as a whole, but when you look at each individual subject on its own you get a bigger picture which makes it look more real. Some artists who influenced my art were Marilyn McAvoy, Wayne Thiebaud, Michael Shepherd, Chardin, Jason Hicks, Dick Frizzel, and Calanetto.

My favourite piece is the 'objects in a row' from 2.2 because I like the composition of the cars and how the details vary. The red truck is more detailed and intricate as it's the largest car, whereas the car on the far left is more blurry and simple which helps with making it clear which car is meant to stand out more. The perspective makes it interesting as the composition has allowed the perspective to appear stronger.

The colours compliment each other as they are generally more neutral and toned while there are some brighter uses of colour. I also like the shop from 2.3 as the details in the painting make the dimensions more interesting as the shadows layer on other features. The dollhouse I used for the subject is also what makes it one of my favourite pieces, as the style of it looks older and more intricate which is the type of architecture I like the most.

I used a variety of mediums on my board such as graphite, indian ink, colouring pencils, acrylic paint, watercolour paint and oil paint which were used on either card or watercolour paper. The large variety of mediums allowed me to better depict the pieces and subjects. The larger more detailed pieces were mostly painted, whereas the smaller pieces were typically made out of colouring pencils.

I used multiple techniques in my pieces - especially when doing pencil pieces as I used cross hatching, hatching and scribbling which are kept visible in my pieces. Some of my paintings were kept as smooth and flat as I could while others were slightly thicker with the use of a palette knife and layering.

The way I used colour and patterns helped to create a better flow and connection with my pieces as majority were neutral but when pieces would have brighter aspects I would implement it into future pieces. When doing this I changed the tone so it wasn't too harrowing and took focus away from the focal point. I did the same with the wallpaper from the living room painting and used it in pieces from 2.2 to subtly tie them in together and relate them by changing the main colour to match or contrast the subjects.

On the 24 August some students planted trees at landowners Brian and Marian Jones's property in **Pukekawa**, as part of the Trees For Survival program. The students were completing assessments for NCEA credits and were photographed and assessed as they worked, and others were junior Rotarians who are developing and demonstrating leadership qualities. They discussed the importance of trees for air and water quality and how trees maintain and improve these by reducing runoff, erosion and filtering water entering the waterway.

The site is around a pond fed by several springs at the head of a gully, which feeds into the Whakaoma stream which runs through a large area of native bush with mature canopy. Sedges were planted at the marshy pond edge, flaxes higher up and in wet areas, then cabbage trees, manuka, kanuka, and tarata and karamu above that. All the plants were marked with stakes to help with aftercare. They all worked hard and enjoyed a well earned lunch with venison patties, sausages, baking and fruit. On 7 September another teacher returned with Adrian Clark and another four students to plant the remainder of their plants.


