



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PRINCIPAL'S COMMENTS

It has been a great year at Tuakau College. Our 1999 exam results were outstanding. Seven out of eight bursary candidates got a bursary and we also received six scholarships. In school Certificate 62% of papers sat were passed. This was the best set of results the school has ever achieved and it is a credit to the students who achieved them, the parents who supported them and the staff at Tuakau College who taught them. Academically we were the top school in the Franklin District.

We won the year 7 Franklin Mathex Competition for the third time in four years and came second in the year 8 section.

Our education outside the classroom continues to flourish with the Duke of Edinburgh scheme being extremely successful. Camps ran at Year 8 and Year 10 and the Year 12 ski trip went ahead for the first time in three years.

In sport the highlight was winning the Boys under 19 pair at the New Zealand Secondary Schools Rowing Championship, closely followed by the girls 1st XI soccer team who came third in their National Tournament.

Our rock band, "Inbreed", came second in the Manukau Regional competition - a great achievement.

Students have demonstrated all year that they can compete at the highest level and are living proof that students from Tuakau College can do anything.

Once again the staff have done an excellent year's work and provided the students with a wonderful range of opportunities.

I continue to encourage the students to take responsibility for their own actions and to aim high, while at all times demonstrating that they are honest, trustworthy, reliable and respectful.

To all students and staff leaving Tuakau College at the end of the year, best wishes for the future. To those returning in 2001, have a great break and we will see you back again next year, continuing to meet the challenge of the new millennium.

TECHNOLOGY UPGRADE


Tuakau College has grown again, this time with the new Technology workshop, which was completed in October. The new workshop was built as part of a Technology upgrade.

From the road to the *pepsimokefreerockquest2000* in Manukau City to the *Music Awards 2000* our students have excelled.

The year of performances began with Duncan, Wilhelm and Mr Allnatt playing at the renaming of Pokeno to *jenniferann.com*.

Inbreed formed and this power trio cut their teeth at Tuesday assemblies in Term one. It was clear from the outset that the R&B rhythms of Whiti Hira, Wilhelm's staccato metal bass riffs, and Duncan's driving, blues-based Hendrix-influenced guitar would gel. *Inbreed* became the perfect vehicle for Duncan's searching lyrics and crafted melodic riffs.

It was no surprise to those who travelled to Otago (thanks to Mrs Simpson, Mrs Hucker and many staff, students and other wellwishers) that our bands performed so well in the regional heats.

Bandaid, with Rebecca Harris on guitar, Rachael Just playing bass, Heather Mailey as drummer and Michelle Blundell, the lead vocalist, were sensational at the regional smokefree heats. Rebecca has written and produced the songs for this group, developed new chordal riffs on guitar, and the reformed Skindeep went on to take out the senior rock band award for 2000.

Then *Inbreed*, fast maturing as a frontline band, took out second place at the South Auckland - Manukau *smokefree* finals 2000. The band won a recording deal and a voucher for \$400 to spend at the *Rockshop*. Duncan was judged best musician at these regional finals, receiving a cash prize of \$500. 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
YEAR 12/13 TOURISM AND GEOGRAPHY

They took part in a series of role-plays, reliving events in the lives of Aucklanders; anticipating a ball in the city, awaiting the arrival of a ship bringing cargo, working as servants and enjoying afternoon tea with relatives.

They also made acquaintance with a huge stuffed elephant and looked at many aspects of Auckland and New Zealand in earlier times.



YEAR 11 HISTORY

The Year 11 class went on a field trip to Turangawaewae marae as part of their Race Relations topic. Mrs Poutapu, who gave them a brief history of Turangawaewae, met them at the marae. She explained to them the links between Tuakau people and the people at Ngaruawahia, and in particular talked about the life of Princess of Te Puea. They were given a guided tour of the marae, including the new wharemoae and their murals. Then it was onto the Ngaruawahia High School marae, Ngahuingaongawai (the meeting of the waters). They were welcomed by the Deputy Principal, Mr Crawford, and after the speeches had lunch with the students at Ngaruawahia, before returning to Tuakau College.



YEAR 13 HISTORY

Year 13 History spent a day in April visiting historical sites of importance to the Wars of the Waikato 1863-64. Some sites such as the Alexandra Redoubt were well preserved and it was easy to visualise what it may have been like at that time. Others such as Pickard's Redoubt at Whangamarino were more difficult to locate. The Pukekohe East church, Martyn's Farm, Mercer, Meremere and the Rangiriri Redoubt were just a few of the sites visited and which helped to improve the students' local historical knowledge.



PIO PIO EXCHANGE



The 1st XV in 2000 was a very young side and sometimes took the field with half the team from either the fifth or fourth form.


