

Koorero a te Tumuaki The Principal speaks:

Kia ora koutou katoa. Nga mihi nui kia koutou. Nau mai haere mai hoki mai ko te tuarua kura o Tuakau.

We're once again welcoming all our students and staff back at school after the Auckland region was in lockdown at Alert Level 3. As a College we were in a 'catch 22' situation where two thirds of our staff lived in the Auckland region. With the borders guarded and the teachers not being classed as essential workers, I could not staff the school, hence the reason why school was closed at this time. This made it very difficult for the community and the College but we engaged with the students with online learning and learning pack distribution.

We are now back under Alert Level 2! Our health and safety plan is in place, as it has been under every alert level, and you can be assured we'll continue doing everything we can to keep children safe.

At home please continue with good hand hygiene, cough and sneeze etiquette, appropriate physical distancing when out and about and keeping your child home if they are sick.

The Principal speaks continued: Kei te haere tonu te korero a te Tumuaki:

Face coverings are another way we can help keep ourselves and others safe. The Prime Minister has announced that face coverings will be required on public transport from Monday 31 August, at Alert Level 2 and above. This does NOT apply to school transport (we have good systems in place to manage safety on school transport already). Children and young people do not need to wear face coverings at school but if your child wants to wear a face covering, that's fine. Other public health control measures are in place including children and staff staying home if they are sick, contact tracing, and hygiene requirements.

We're continuing contact tracing by having QR code posters at our entrances and in every classroom, so please check in every time you come onsite. Students can use the tracer app too if they wish too but student attendance and seating plans are used for every period. If you haven't already downloaded the NZ COVID Tracer app the Ministry of Health website has information to help with that. We'll also keep a visitor register for anyone who doesn't have the app, and for anyone who comes onsite for a period of time. This will help us with contact trace in the unlikely case it is needed. For more information about public health measures at Alert Level 2 you can visit the COVID-19 website, and if you have any questions about this please get in touch.

Many of our students and whānau/families may have found this lockdown hard so please, if you are struggling contact the school and we will try to assist you as best we can. Our guidance team may be able to help. If your child is finding it hard to engage in their learning then get them to talk to their teacher or the Guidance Counsellor. We are here to assist where we can.

Staff will be re-evaluating all the classes to see how we can still achieve what we originally set out to do. There will be a lot of adjustments made. Sport and other events dates have been adjusted as well.

It is great to have all the students and staff back to the College!
Kia kaha, kia manawanui, kia hauora - Be strong, be patient, be healthy!

I would like to firstly acknowledge the great team of Mathematics Teachers we have at Tuakau College and thank them for the way they have modified and developed their programmes throughout this year to ensure that our tamariki continue gaining success in Mathematics.

Over the years we have had many Professional Development courses, but nothing has come close to what we as a staff have learnt in the space of eight months this year. 




















Maths Week report Pūrongo Wiki


Mathematics Surveys Rangahau Matapihi

Question 1. How much do you estimate you have increased your mathematical knowledge so far this year?




My teacher encourages me to work well




A word from Rose Salani He kupu no Rose Salani

I really appreciate all that I have learnt from the Math department during my time at Tuakau College, and I am excited to further my learning in my last year at school.




Level 1 Numeracy: Tuakau College Taumata kotahi te tatau: Tuakau College


PR 3 - Cumulative Results by Percentage










PLEASE DO NOT SEND YOUR CHILD TO SCHOOL IF THEY ARE SICK OR HAVE ANY RESPIRATORY OR FLU LIKE SYPTOMS, E.G. RUNNY NOSE, COUGH OR SORE THROAT. If they do attend school we will have to send them home again. Tuakau College has and will be doing a number of things to prevent the spread of Covid-19 such as:

- Reminders about hand washing and social distancing of at least a metre.
 Students not to share food or drink.
- We ensure that surfaces where students have worked are sanitised after each period.
- We encourage children to wash their hands thoroughly and correctly. Soap and water for 20 seconds minimum is best. Hands must be dried completely. Students are supposed to keep a distance of 1.5 m away from each other. As this is impractical in a school, students just need to be aware of distances between themselves and others. Students should refrain from handshakes, hongi, kissing, etc as part of this strategy.
