Koorero a te Tumuaki The Principal speaks:

Kia ora kõutou katoa!

I certainly hope this e-Bulletin finds you all well and safe. We are at the end of August and it is de ja vue with COVID-19 Level 4 lockdown. This time we are very organised in regards to what we have to do. It is something we are getting used to and it will continue this way until we have a threshold of people vaccinated and immunised. The Delta variant is virulent, infectious and is being passed on to young people. This is characterised by a number of infections identified in schools. We are lucky we have not had the virus at Tuakau College, but our nearest neighbour Pukekohe High School has been hit. Our thoughts go out to them as they fight this along with the other schools in our Auckland region. In the last lockdowns it was the elderly we had concerns for, but with the Delta variant it has hit young people hard.

Tuakau College is continuing at Level 4 even though we are in the North Waikato region. This makes sense as we could not staff the school anyway with majority of staff living in the Auckland region (including Pukekohe). I would encourage the school community to follow the Health requirements under Level 4. Stay home in your bubbles and if you are sick get tested (testing station at the Tuakau Sports Club down Escotts Road). Wash hands, stay close to home while exercising in your local area, be at least 2m apart from people not in your bubble, get vaccinated and wear a mask in public.

Last week we had the opportunity to have a contactless system of pickup for devices and hardpacks. Thank you to the staff for their preparation of the work and to parents for coming in and picking up the necessary items.

Thanks to the staff who also went out and delivered the necessary work to letterboxes of homes. Hardpack production will occur again but not until we return to Level 3. Last week was a one off situation (under Level 4) because we did not have time to get these out before going into Level 4. All our classes have online learning through ZOOM as well. The engagement is great with some classes, however some students are not engaging at all. This is actually not unique to Tuakau College - this theme is across New Zealand. I would like to encourage you to get your son/daughter to engage in the online lessons being provided by the hard working staff.

COVID-19 has also hit our school trips and sports very hard. As you all know Term 3 is a very hectic term for trips and sport. Unfortunately, we have not been able to finish the winter sport season. We now have to wait to get back down to Level 2 before we know what happens with finals and semi-finals. Other major events have also been cancelled for the second year in a row like Snow Camp, AIMS and Tournament Week. Our new FYFOD sports event is also a causality. NCEA exams have been pushed back two weeks and our internal exams will be decided on in the next week. So, apart from re-organising lessons, the schools calendar has been tipped upside down as well! As events change we will continue to keep you updated through email, Facebook and Instagram. I know there is a lot of communication but it is very important these messages get to you.

Please keep well over the next weeks. We hope that we have a quick return to school. Level 3 will be a return for students that cannot be supervised at home but only at Level 2 will school open for all students. This week staff have also been contacting whanau and families regarding how everyone is. A key component of Level 4 for us is making sure everyone is okay. We have support for families and students that are struggling with this lockdown. If you know someone that needs support then please don't hesitate to contact Paul Heta (our Guidance Counsellor) and he will be able to help or put you in touch with someone that can. Our key whakatauki to you all is: "Kia kaha (be strong), Kia manawanui (be strong), Kia hauora (be healthy)."

As you will read further in this e-Bulletin we recently blessed a carving dedicated to Jacque Hema, ex Deputy Principal of Tuakau College who passed away from cancer several years ago. This taonga (gift) finishes off the wall of the iHub which was painted by Roanne Gordon (Art Teacher). The taonga represents the passing of knowledge from the past to the future. Thanks to the school community for being there to bless this wonderful taonga for our kura. We also blessed our new Pātaka Kai. This is gift for our community. It is part of our plan as we grow vegetables and share these with the community. This whakatauki sums up the meaning of the pātaka kai: "Nāu te rourou, nāku te rourou, ka ora ai te iwi - With your food basket and my food basket, the people will prosper."

The next month is a key month for the Senior students learning and their preparation for their exams. Even though the exams have been put back two weeks the students need to keep on top of their studies through these difficult times. The staff are prepared to support the students as they make progress on their standards. If you have any concerns please get the student to email their teachers. A huge thank you to our kaumatua Miki Graham for the blessings. Thanks also to our carver of the taonga and Pataka Kai, Uenuku Hawira.
















Horticulture Students Landscaping Project Hortikurea Tauira Kaupapa Whenua

Once again we all had to upskill ourselves with different digital learning platforms. This has been very challenging however most rewarding. We have had two Teacher Only Days this year to learn about the changes to NCEA. We're in the process of strengthening NCEA by making a series of changes to improve well-being, equity, coherence, pathways and credibility – for students and teachers alike.

I acknowledge the great team of Mathematics Teachers we have at Tuakau College and thank them for the way they have modified and developed their programmes throughout this year to ensure that our tamariki continue gaining success in Mathematics.




My teacher prepares me well for tests and assignments


How much effort do you feel you have put in so far this year?




Are you satisfied with your effort you have made so far?

This was an opportunity given to us as Year 13 female students with an interest in engineering, to get a first person, hands on experience with this area of study and all the specializations UOA has to offer.

The day was split into two Alumni panels and four workshops for each group. This gave us a chance to listen and network with the inspiring Alumni, PhD students and lectures, who told us about their amazing experiences and pathways in engineering at UOA. The workshops gave us a small taste of four out of the ten different specialization's.

This included things such as in the structural engineering workshop, where we built structures out of sticks and glue which then was tested on a earthquake simulator for stability.
